Sharon Marie All was born in Niagara Falls and later grew up in Scottsville and then Marion, New York. Sharon graduated from Marion High School where she was an honor student, participated in many activities, and was chosen for Prom Queen.

Sharon began her college career at SUNY Fredonia and after one year, transferred to SUNY Brockport where she graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology.

Coming from a large family, Sharon did not receive a lot of financial support from her parents for college. She worked weekends, summers and holidays at Mobil Chemical's Design Products Plant in Macedon, New York to help pay her college expenses.

After graduating from college, Sharon backpacked through several European countries with a friend from High School. This was a wonderful experience for Sharon. When she returned to the U.S., she started working for Newark Developmental Center. Soon thereafter she secured a job at Mobil Chemical Company in Macedon as a Management Trainee.
